6. PUBLIC MEETING - WHAT'S IN THE AIR?!

Residents of Crofton, Chemainus, Duncan, Salt Spring Island and Maple Ridge are in the airshed of NorskeCanada's Crofton pulp mill.

A wide variety of toxic emissions currently released into the airshed include sulphurs, particulates, volatile organic compounds, furans and dioxins.

The company seeks provincial authority to burn rubber tires, coal and

treated railway ties during a 30 month trial burn beginning in the spring.

The deadline for public feedback regarding the application is January 31,

2004. Permission has already been given for similar actions at

NorskeCanada mills in Pt. Alberni, Campbell River (Elk Falls), and Powell

River.

Crofton is an old mill and currently losing \$10 million quarterly. If

these trials are successful Norske claims that operating costs and existing

air emissions will be improved, based on hotter, more complete combustion

of their primary fuel sources: wet salty bark and treatment sludge. However

many questions & exceptions persist.

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CITIZENS TO HOLD FORUM on CROFTON POLLUTION

U.S. Experts Agree To Be on Panel

(Crofton, BC) The Crotfon Airshed Citizens Group will hold a public forum on January 20 regarding Norske Canada?s proposal to burn coal, rubber and creosote-laden railway ties. Representatives from Norske, the government, Canadian and U.S. independent experts, and the community will answer questions and engage in dialogue.

"We are already very alarmed about Norske?s existing emissions of dioxins, furans, PCB?s, chlorine, hydrogen sulfide, sulfur dioxide, and particulate matter," said Michael Ableman of the Citizens Group. "These new burning materials promise to add to the toxic stew coming out of that mill and into the air our children breathe. Operating the equivalent of a toxic waste incinerator within the airshed of several communities is dangerous and irresponsible."

Panelists at the forum will include Rich Stedman, Executive Director of the Olympic Region Clean Air Agency, and Rob Duff, Director of the Washington State Health Department Office of Environmental Assessment

Norske is petitioning the province for a 30-month trial permit to burn "alternative" fuels that are cheaper than natural gas. **The public comment period on the proposal has been extended to January 31.**

Norske claims that the fuels will lower some emissions but raise others, while saving the mill money. The company conducts all monitoring and interpretation of data, an approach the District of Campbell

River recently found to be flawed during a similar test in Norske?s Elk Falls mill after an independent report challenged Norske?s conclusions.

The root problem is the transportation of logs in salt water, which leads to wet salty hog fuel going into the mills. As a result, BC?s pulp mills give BC the highest emissions of dangerous dioxins and furans in Canada, according to an organization called Pollution Watch (www.pollutionwatch.org). BC recently rolled back pulp mill pollution standards.

Air emissions from the mill cover a wide area including Duncan, Saltspring Island, Maple Bay, and as far North as the Nanaimo Airport and as far South as Central Saanich.

The public forum will be held Tuesday January 20th at 7:00 p.m. at the Crofton Community Center.

10. WORLD PREMIER "THE VALUE OF LIFE: AIDS IN AFRICA REVISITED"

Filmed by Judy Jackson for THE NATURE OF THINGS WITH DAVID SUZUKI

This film will be released to the public January 21 at 7 p.m. on CBC television.

A special preview will be shown at the University of Victoria on Monday, January 19 at 7 p.m. in Room 159 of the Fraser (Law) Building.

This world premier will be followed by a panel discussion on the importance of affordable AIDS medication. Admission is free and seating is limited.

The film features Stephen Lewis, UN HIV/AIDS envoy to Africa and Maclean's magazine's ?Canadian of the Year?. The film?s release coincides with

international focus on Canada?s House of Commons where a piece of precedent-setting legislation will be re-introduced - a bill inspired by Lewis and prominent Canadian Aid Agencies. The legislation would enable bulk production of generic anti-AIDS drugs for Africa's dying.

THE NATURE OF THINGS returned to Africa with Lewis last summer, and The Value of Life: AIDS in Africa Revisited traces his incredible journey - a personal voyage that led him from hope to despair and back to hope. This hour-long special, airing without commercials, is a follow-up to the award-winning Race Against Time (2001). In 2001, Lewis was optimistic. Kofi Annan, UN Secretary general, had declared a war on AIDS and, at a special session of the UN, established a Global Fund enabling richer countries to help poorer ones fight the disease. With the world focused on AIDS, Lewis believed the pandemic could be stopped in its tracks.

But then came September 11, and the world's attention turned to homeland security and fighting terrorism. With promises of financial aid to Africa broken, Lewis's optimism turned to disbelief. The world seemed to be ignoring more than six thousand people dying of AIDS every day. In the West, anti-retroviral drugs changed AIDS from a death sentence to a challenging chronic illness. In Africa where four million people need AIDS medication, only 75,000 have access to the life prolonging drugs. An entire generation of economically-productive adults is being lost to HIV/AIDS. Compounding this crisis, there are 11 million African AIDS orphans under the age of 15.

But in the fall of 2003 the momentum finally re-ignited. Hope. Following

endless disputes about how and when countries with health crises can

overthrow the patents held by big pharmaceutical companies in order to

access cheaper generic

anti-AIDS drugs, a resolution was reached. The World Health Organization

pledged to have three million people on anti-AIDS drugs by 2005. That means

a staggering six million pills will be needed every day. It was the sheer

volume of drugs needed that led Lewis and some Canadian aid agencies to

challenge the Canadian government to pass legislation allowing patents to be

put aside here in Canada so cheaper generics can be made for the dying. If

the bill passes it will make history.

The Value of Life: AIDS in Africa Revisited is produced and directed by Judy

Jackson. Michael Allder is executive producer of THE NATURE OF THINGS.





MONTREAL - The world's biodiversity is declining at an alarming rate, threatening human well-being and future development and requiring important efforts and new thinking on conservation, a sweeping international report released on Thursday says.

The report is the second of seven reports billed as the world's largest study of changes to Earth's ecosystems and their impact on humans. It is the result of five years of collaboration between 1,360 experts from 95 countries around the world.

Human activity is responsible for a reduction of biodiversity, which degrades ecosystems and penalizes other groups of people, especially the poorest who depend most on them, according to the report presented at McGill University in Montreal to mark the International Day for Biological Diversity.

Entitled "Ecosystems and Human Well-being: the Biodiversity Synthesis Report," it was prepared by the U.N. Millennium Ecosystem Assessment with the cooperation of the Convention on Biological Diversity.

"The loss of biodiversity is a major barrier to development already and poses increasing risks for future generations," said Walter Reid, the director of the Millennium Assessment, "However, the report shows that the management tools, policies, and technologies do exist to dramatically slow this loss."

According to the report changes in biodiversity due to human activities were more rapid in the past 50 years than at any time in human history, and over the last 100 years species extinction caused by humans has multiplied as much as 1,000 times.

Some 12 percent of birds; 23 percent of mammals; 25 percent of conifers and 32 percent of amphibians are threatened with extinction, and the world's fish stocks have been reduced by an astonishing 90 percent since the start of industrial fishing.

"We will need to make sure that we don't disrupt the biological web to the point where collapse of the whole system becomes irreversible," warns Anantha Kumar Duraiappah, of Canada's International Institute for Sustainable Development, one of the co-chairs of the report.

The report notes that while efforts have helped reduce the loss of biodiversity more action is needed as little progress is foreseen in the short term.

"The magnitude of the challenge of slowing the rate of biodiversity loss is demonstrated by the fact that most of the direct drivers of biodiversity loss are projected to either remain constant or increase in the near future," the report says.

The report blames biodiversity change on a number of factors including habitat conversion, climate change, pollution and over-exploitation of resources.


